Matla and Rudnicki Families



My grandfather (Dziadzi), Joseph Matla, was born on March 6, 1882 in Przeciszow, Pow Wadowice, Poland and after coming to America he settled in Lackawanna, New York. He was

working for Bethlehem Steel Company at the time.

My grandmother (Babgi), Lucy Czuba was born on December 8, 1883 in Praeciszow, Pow Wadowice, Poland also settled in Lackawanna, New York. They did not know each other in Poland. My babgi did domestic work in Poland and Lackawanna. She was an excellent cook. When the bishop and priests came to Bethlehem for services, they requested my babgi cook for them. She cooked the meals like they were use to in Poland.

Dziadzi needed a wife, so he told her, "If you marry me, you will not have to work for anyone else". They got married at St. Barbara's Parish in Lackawanna, New York on June 3, 1905. Shortly after they were married, Dziadzi was transferred to Bethlehem, PA and worked for the steel company until his retirement. They had five children: Stanley, Anthony, Katheryne, Frank and Edward.

My grandfather (Dziadzi), Walter Rudnicki was born on August 13, 1890 in Wroble, Poland and after coming to America settled in Bethlehem, Pa. He also worked for Bethlehem Steel Company until his retirement.

My grandmother (Babgi), Eva Mil was born on November 18, 1898 in Bialystok, Poland also settled in Bethlehem, PA. She met my dziadzi and they were married at St. Stanislaus Parish, Bethlehem, PA on February 2, 1918. They had three children: Stella, Anna and Mary. My babgi worked at St. Luke's Hospital until her retirement.

Both Polish families belonged to St Stanislaus Parish in Bethlehem. The priest at St. Stanislaus was always collecting money to build a parochial school on the church property. My Dziadzi Matla refused to give any more money until he saw work on the school in progress. The priest refused my father, Frank, First Holy Communion until my dziadzi paid the money. So they left St. Stanislaus Parish. By the way, that school was never built.

In the meantime, a new Polish Catholic parish was being formed on the south side of Bethlehem. This church was only a block away from where the Matla family resided and the masses were in Polish. The church was Our Lord's Ascension Parish of the Polish National Catholic Church. They joined the parish and so did the Rudnicki family and many other Polish families from St. Stanislaus.

This church was their social life. They were small in numbers but big at heart. My uncle Stanley was the first organist and choir director for the parishes in Bethlehem and Allentown. From what I was told, they had a great choir (The Moniuszko Choir) and they performed at many of the Polish National Catholic Churches. My dad said the only choir better was the Cathedral Parish in Scranton, PA.

My uncle Stanley and Aunt Mary were the first couple married at Our Lord's Ascension Parish in the south side of Bethlehem.

My Uncle Tony, the Very Reverend Anthony Matla was a priest for over forty years in the Chicago Diocese. He hosted a radio show in Chicago and was the chief spokesman at the General Synod in Chicago in 1958. He spearheaded the interchurch movement for incorporating the mass in the English language.

Frank Matla met Stella Rudnicki at Our Lord's Ascension Parish. My dad told me when he saw my mother he knew she was the one for him. They were married on June 5, 1937. They had two children, Gerald and Frank.

My dad retired from Bethlehem Steel Company and my mom retired from Modern Clothing Company. Stella was very active in the parish. She sang with the Moniuszko Choir and held many offices in the church societies. She was the organist for 57 years until her death on March 13, 1992. A plaque hangs in the narthex commemorating her many years of service.

The Dog Days of Summer



What are the dog days of summer? The dog days of summer seems to be a

natural expression. In hot weather dogs pant and lie as flat on the ground as they can to avoid the heat. However, the expression doesn't originate with the behavior of dogs during the summer. It reaches farther back in time to some mistaken astronomical impressions of the Greeks and Romans.

During hot weather, particularly the period from mid - July through August, the star Sirius part of the constellation Canis Major (the big dog), rises and sets with the sun. It was believed by the ancients that this rising and setting produced extra heat for the Earth. This explanation was used to account for the hot and sultry heat produced during the summer months.

Of course we now know that, while Sirius produces a tiny amount of light energy in our direction, it isn't responsible for the dog days of summer. The hot weather is actually caused by the tilt of the Earth in relationship to the Sun. In the Northern Hemisphere, this slight tilt allows the Earth to receive more direct sunlight beginning on June 21st. Thank God for air conditioning.

An air conditioner was purchased for the conference room to make working on parish business bearable. Railroad Cake
5 cups sifted flour 1 cup sugar 1 teaspoon baking powder 1 teaspoon baking soda 1/2 lb. butter 2 Tablespoons Crisco 5 egg yolks 1 small sour cream 1 teaspoon vanilla pinch of salt
Sift dry ingredients. Add butter, eggs, sugar, Crisco and the rest of ingredients. Mix well. Divide dough into 3 equal parts. Roll first dough and put on large jelly roll pan. Spread with walnut mixture. Roll second dough and put on top of first layer. Spread with lekvar, apricot, or pineapple preserves. Roll third dough and put on top of second layer. Spread with lekvar, apricot or pine-apple preserves. Sprinkle with reserved walnut mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes.
Walnut mixture:

11/2 cups ground walnuts1/2 cup sugarReserve 1/4 cup to sprinkle on top.Add a little milk to mixture before spreading on first layer.
