

Toasted Almond Ice Cream Cake

Ingredients:

1 pkg. (10 oz.) Lorna Doone Cookies, coarsely crushed (about 3 cups), divided 1 cup Planters Slivered Almonds, toasted



1/2 gallon vanilla ice cream, softened, divided Chocolate syrup to taste

Preparation:

Sprinkle 1 cup crushed cookies and 1/3 cup almond on bottom of 9 in. springform pan. Carefully spread half the ice cream evenly over cookie mixture. Top with 1 cup crushed cookies and 1/3 almonds. Top with remaining ice cream, cookies and almonds, firmly pressing cookie mixture into the ice cream. Cover with plastic wrap.

Freeze for at least 4 hours. Remove side of springform pan and cut to serve. Drizzle with chocolate syrup.

Hint:

To toast nuts, spread in single layer on baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 5 to 7 minutes or until lightly toasted.
