Repairs and Improvements Lighting

If you have been in church in the last couple of weeks you may have noticed a brightness over the altar area. That's because all of the existing lights over the altar have been replaced with state of the art "LED" Lighting. The previous fixtures were originals back from 1976 and have not been operating properly for some time. The lights on both Sts. Mary & Joseph's Altars have been replaced with LED's as well. Thanks to Catherine Trawinski's donation, we were able to accomplish this project.



Also, if you have been at the church in the evening (especially now that it is dark earlier), we have been able to enhance the lighting in the parking lot with the addition of a large watt LED lighting fixture located on the outside of the rear wall of the church. This

significantly helps brighten up the area making it easier to see and adds additional security. We have also replaced the church roof lighting on the steeple (once we replaced the roof). Please remember that LED lighting only uses a small percentage of the watts conventional lighting used and expect to see some cost savings with all the lighting projects we have done. Thanks to the YMS of R, three heaters were added in the basement and the wall heaters in the committee room and the Narthex of the church were repaired and are now in working order.

Roof

Due to a very generous donation from a Parishioner, we were able to make plans to replace our 26-year old main roof. After receiving multiple quotes and selecting the best bid, we received disheartening news that the entire roof would need to be covered with plywood for the shingles to be warranted. This would add \$10,000.00 to the original roof quote. We decided as a Committee that getting the roof done before winter was

important, and Church societies including the YMS of R and the ANS have generously pledged funds to help cover this unexpected cost. However, we still face a shortfall as the total bill will exceed \$29,000.00. Please consider making a contribution to help defray the roof expense before year end, and remember that it is tax deductible. Lesser Know Saints Saint Francis Xavier



Francis was born in the family castle of Xavier near Pamplona, Spain in 1506. He was sent to the University of Paris and met Ignatius

Loyola and became one of the seven who founded the Society of Jesus. In 1538 he left Paris to join Ignatius in Venice and was ordained there and went to Rome a year later. When the Pope formally recognized the Society, he and Fr. Simon Rodriguez were ordered to the Far East as the first Jesuit missionaries. He spent six months in Mozambique preaching and giving aid to the sick. He eventually arrived in Goa, India. There he began preaching to the natives and attempted to reform his fellow Europeans, living among the natives. During the next decade, he converted tens of thousands to Christianity. In 1551 India and the East were set up as a separate province and Ignatius made Francis its first provincial. In 1552 he set out for China, landed on the island of Sancian within sight of his goal, but died before he reached the mainland. He left the mark of his missionary zeal and energy on areas which clung to Christianity for centuries. He was canonized in 1622 along with his friend, Ignatius Loyola. Francis was proclaimed patron of all foreign missions on December 3 which became his feast day.

Shortbread Cookies

3/4 cup softened butter 2/3 cup sugar

2 egg yolks

1Tbsp. light cream

1 tsp. vanilla

2 cups flour



Beat butter and sugar on medium speed until light (3 min.). Add egg yolks, cream and vanilla. Beat until fluffy. Add flour gradually until well combined and smooth.

Divide in half and wrap in plastic. Refrigerate 2 hours or longer.

Roll on floured surface with rolling pin to about 1/4" thick. Cut with cookie cutter. Decorate.

Bake at 325 degrees for 10 to 15 minutes
