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Road to the Priesthood

But now, this is what the Lord says he who created you, Jacob, he who formed you, Israel: "Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have summoned you by name; you are mine.

June 26th is the 15th Anniversary of my priesthood. It has been only 15 years, but this number pushed me toward reflecting on how it happened that I became a

priest. Already in the seminary, these words from the Book of Isaiah opened my heart for the mysterious presence of God in my life. I feel it talks to me.

When I read these words from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah, I see in front of my eyes a history of my calling. I was born the youngest of eight. My parents kept a farm, so the life of the family was run by the nature of the season. The work and attendance in the church were the most important things in our family. From my childhood I could see the Lord's presence in my life. Once we had a fire at home, and I was only three months old. My older sister (she was four at that time) had the task to watch me when our parents and neighbors were busy with the construction of our new home. Nobody paid attention to what was going on in the old house, so the fire took over the whole house, and my sister ran away being so scared. Finally somebody spotted the fire and they ran to save me - some of the people had the opinion that it was already too late. Thanks to the heroic heart of my mother, she was able to save my life. Nobody knew it at that time, but she saved the future priest.

I was a very good student at school, and I was a normal boy in the village like others boys. For some reason the people in the village started to tell me, "You will be a priest". Looking back, I understand why. When I was only seven. I was the one who made the funerals for the chickens clothed as a priest. I was the one who gathered older ladies in the village to go and sing religious songs before the statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary in May. Coming back from the school. I always stopped in the house where somebody died to pray for this person. Soon the oldest brother went to the seminary, but after one year of study, he decided to withdrawal from it. The family experienced a lot of shame because of that. Mentality of people in Poland was so judgmental at that time about issues like that, and it is not changed until today.

When I was a teenager, I had some moments of having a big desire to be a priest, but being so busy with friends, sports, and knowing the experience of my brother, I was afraid to share with anyone my feelings. I struggled with myself until the last class in High School. I remember we had a retreat for my class, and during those days my desire came to life again and I decided to do something about it. Not talking to my relatives, I sent my application to the seminary and only after approval did I deliver this message to my family. I remember today, the tears of my mom, and the anger of my father. They were able finally to accept my decision.

The years were passing by, and I was ordained. I expressed my wish to the Bishop to serve in Russia. After three months of service in the Warsaw Parish, I found myself in Russia where I received two parishes to take care of.

Dealing with the reality of the Russian society, I realized that many rules of the Roman Catholic Church were hard to be implemented there, and they were difficult to be absorbed by the people. Weighing all the aspects of my ministry, I came to the point that I decided to switch to another church, the Polish National Catholic Church where I presently serve. This transformation took me a year because of the paper work, immigration procedures, and

phone calls from Bishop Grotnik and from my friends, the priests who helped me to make this transition.

Soon after leaving the Roman Catholic Church, I married my wife Anna, and the Lord gave us two beautiful children, twin girls, Barbara and Magda. We all were able to move to the United States where we found our new home, a new family in our new church. My heart proclaims thanks to the Lord for His Divine Providence by showing me another path to serve Him with a new heart. I experienced during this 15 years of my life God's assistance and His assurance that He watches over me. I experienced also that God never leaves us behind - we are not forgotten. God always has us, and our needs, in front of His eyes continuing His plan which He already started.

I give thanks to the Lord again who chose me to be his servant, and I am so happy that He continues to whisper in my ear:

"Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have summoned you by name; you are mine

For I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior"

Father's Day Breakfast




How do you like your waffles? Some like them with maple syrup and sausages. Some like them with strawberries and whipped cream. Fathers and their
