He asked me out and the rest is history.

After Joe graduated from trade school in 1960, he was offered a job at Western Electric and moved to the Lehigh Valley from Taylor. For 2 1/2 vears Joe drove to Scranton every Wednesday after work so we could be He would drive back to together. Allentown early Thursday morning to be at work at 7 AM.

The first thing we did after moving to an apartment here was to look for the Polish National Catholic Church in the

Lehigh Valley. When we walked into the church on 5th and Williams Street on that first Sunday it took only a few steps to reach the front pew - very different from the large church in Scranton. Within months Joe was on the church council, where he remained for 30 years. He also organized the YMS of R and Wednesday night Bingo. Joe is again a trustee on the church council and runs the church lottery calendar.

I joined the Society of Friends early in our marriage and stayed until 1996. I also taught Sunday school for 10 years from the time our daughter Sharon was 2 years old. We are part of the Friday night Pierogi Makers, peeling and preparing the 60 pounds of potatoes and can also be found helping at the fall and spring bazaars.

Joe and I had two children, Sharon, husband Anthony Seritsky, grandchildren Marcus and Jasmine, of Catasaugua, PA and Mark (deceased 2003), grandchildren Marissa and Braedon Jurnock Kulick, of Anthem, AZ.

Labor Day



For many of us who arew up in the fifties and sixties, Labor Day was the time for the

last family picnic or the final weekend vacation at the Jersey shore. It was the unofficial end of summer. School would begin in a few days. But what were we celebrating? Labor Day is a day set aside to pay tribute to working men and women. Labor unions themselves celebrated the first Labor Days in the United States, although it is not exactly known who came up with the idea. Most historians credit Peter McGuire, general secretary of the Brothers of Joiners and Carpenters and cofounder of the American Federation of Labor, with the original idea of a day for workers to show their solidarity.

The first Labor Day celebration in the United States can be traced to New Citv's Union Sauare September 5, 1882. It was designed as a way to appease city workers after numerous strikes and in some cases even violence. Labor Day has been celebrated on the first Monday of September every year since. In 1894, President Grover Cleveland declared that Labor Day be an official holiday.

Chocolate Zucchini Cake

½ cup butter, softened

½ cup vegetable oil

1 3/4 cups white sugar

2 eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

½ cup sour milk

2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa powder

1 teaspoon baking soda

½ teaspoon ground cinnamon

2 cups shredded zucchini

1 cup semisweet chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C), grease and flour a 9x13 inch pan.

- Cream butter, oil and sugar until light and fluffy
- Add eggs, vanilla and sour milk. Beat until smooth.
- Mix flour, cocoa, baking soda and cinnamon together and add to creamed mixture. Beat well.
- 4. Stir in shredded zucchini.
- 5. Pour into a 9x13 inch pan and sprinkle top with chocolate
- 6. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 to 45 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean.

Variation:

- Add ½ cup chopped nuts
- Substitute or add peanut butter chips
- Omit chocolate chips and frost with your favorite cream cheese frosting

To make your own sour milk mix one tablespoon lemon juice or distilled vinegar to each cup of milk. Let sit for 15 minutes. A great cake for all that zucchini at the end of the season, and the kids love it too! — Andrea Gritman
