Rev. Donald Wunderlich



In the presence of our diocesan Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Bernard Nowicki and representatives from Our Lord's Ascension and Our Saviour Parishes, the Most Rev. Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop of the Polish National Catholic Church ordained Deacon Donald Wunderlich to the Holy Priesthood at St. Stanislaus Bishop & Martyr Cathedral in Scranton on August 27, 2016. Rev. Wunderlich served his first mass as a priest at Our Saviour Parish on Sunday, August 28.

Donald Wunderlich was baptized at the Sacred Heart of Jesus Parish in Homestead, Pennsylvania. His parents influenced his early spiritual development in the church and encouraged him and his brothers to serve as acolytes for many years. He began his studies for the Diaconate in September 1999 and was ordained as a Sub-deacon in May 2000. For the next few years he continued his studies in New Jersey and Florida. Moving to Easton in 2004, he and his family became members of Our Lord's Ascension Parish and in August 2014 he was ordained as a deacon. Immediatelv afterward Deacon Donald was assigned to provide services at Our Saviour Parish in Lawrenceville, New Jersey.

Saint Damien



Saint Damien was known as the Leper Priest, the Hero of Molokai. Born Joseph in Tremelo, Belgium, on January 3, 1840,

he received the name Damien in religious life. He joined the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary, a missionary religious institute. In 1864 he was sent to Honolulu, Hawaii, where he was ordained. For the next nine years he worked in missions on the big island. He then went to the leper colony on Molokai, after volunteering for the assignment. Damien cared for lepers of all ages, but was particularly concerned about the children segregated in the colony. He announced he was a leper in 1885 and continued to build hospitals, clinics, churches and some six hundred coffins before he died in 1889 on Molokai. Father Damien was canonized on October 11, 2009 in the presence of King Albert II of Belgium, the Belgium Prime Minister and several cabinet members. He has two feast days, October 11, which when he was canonized and May 10 which is obligatory in Hawaii.

He has been described as a "martyr of charity." He was the tenth person in what is the United States to be recognized as a saint. Damien's symbols are a tree and a dove. In Saint Damien's role as the unofficial patron of those with leprosy or Hansen's disease, HIV and AIDS, the world's only memorial chapel to those who died of these diseases, is at the Eglise Saint-Pierre-Apotre in Montreal, Quebec, which is consecrated to him. 2105 Jennings Street Bethlehem, PA 18017 Office: 610-694-0164 www.ourlordsascension.org

Blueberry Dump Cake

Ingredients

- 1 20oz. can crushed pineapple
- 1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts
- 1 can blueberry pie filling
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1 pkg. yellow cake mix



Grease a 13" x 9" x 2" baking pan. In pan dump and spread 1 can of undrained pineapple. Dump pie filling on top and spread. Dump dry cake mix (right out of the box) over blueberry layer. Spread evenly. Sprinkle pecans over top. Pat dabs of butter on top and bake at 350 degrees for 50 to 55 minutes. Can be made, baked and ready to eat with ice cream in 1 hour!! For variety, cherry pie filling may be used in place of blueberry. *Simple and fuss free recipe everyone will love*
