Roses

This Valentine's Day many of us will send or receive the gift of red roses. The Red Rose not only carries more mean-

ing than many other color roses, it is also one of the most universal of all symbols. Red Roses have been represented in countless works of art, from classical paintings and poetry to modern day music. They have appeared throughout history and across many cultures as political and religious symbols. However, it is as the symbol for love and romance that the Red Rose is most commonly recognized.

The first Christian use of the rose appears in scenes representing the next world, which is Paradise together with other flowers like lilies. These also became symbols of virtues (the rose for reserve and the lily for virginity). The Red Rose was the symbol for martyrs. The rose as the queen of flowers was a symbol for Mary, Queen of heaven and earth. The first representation of Mary holding a rose and not a scepter appears at the end of the thirteenth century. Mary contemplating a rose may mean that the rose symbolized Christ.

The rose became a moral emblem to explain life. For example, "Life is a rose: its beauty fades rapidly," or "As the rose blossoms under the sun, I shall blossom under the eyes of God". And, "The rose of our life blossoms among thorns, meaning pains, hard work and wickedness; but God brings good out of miseries".

George Washington's Birthday Chocolate Cherry Cake

CAKE:

1 box Duncan Hines Devils

Food cake mix 1 can cherry pie filling

- 1 can cherry pie mining 1 ten almond flavoring
- 1 tsp. almond flavoring

2 eggs

- Put pie filling in large bowl and chop up cherries.
- Add eggs, almond flavoring and cake mix.
- Stir with fork until well mixed.
- Pour into greased and floured 9 x 13-inch baking pan and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.
- Ice immediately upon removing from oven.

FROSTING:

1 c. white sugar

1/3 c. milk

- 5 tbsp. butter
- 1 c. chocolate chips
- 1/2 c. chopped pecans
- Bring sugar, milk and butter to a boil in saucepan. Boil about 1 minute stirring constantly.
- Remove from heat and stir in chocolate chips, stirring until melted.
- Add pecans.
- Pour over hot cake.
