11 Things You May Not Have Known About Thanksgiving



We rounded up 11 of the best facts about Thanksgiving, which might come in handy during those awkward silences at

the family dinner table.

- 1. There are three places in the US named Turkey. There is Turkey, Texas; Turkey, North Carolina; and Turkey Creek, Louisiana. There are also two townships in Pennsylvania called Upper Turkeyfoot and Lower Turkeyfoot.
- 2. The first Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade used live animals from the Central Park Zoo. .
- 3. Jingle Bells was originally a Thanksgiving song. **James** Pierpoint composed the song in 1857 children for celebrating Thanksgiving. The title was "One Horse Open Sleigh," and it was such a hit that it was sung again at Christmas. The song quickly associated with became the Christmas holiday season, and the title was officially changed in 1859, two years later.
- 4. The Detroit Lions always play on Thanksgiving. Football is so ingrained in the Thanksgiving holiday that many people think the game is just as important as the turkey. The Dallas Cowboys also always play on Thanksgiving.
- 6. The Wednesday before Thanksgiving is responsible for the most bar sales in America, more than New Year's Eve, the Super Bowl, or even St. Patrick's Day. It makes sense, since nearly all Americans have Thanksgiving off and dealing with family members can be very stressful.

- 7. Thanksgiving leftovers inspired the first-ever TV dinner. In 1953, the Swanson Company overestimated the demand for turkey. The owners of the company had no idea what to do with all the leftovers. Taking inspiration from airplane meals, they ordered 5,000 aluminum trays, and loaded them with the turkey leftovers to create the first TV dinner.
- 8. Benjamin Franklin wanted the turkey to be the official bird of the US. He thought turkeys were much more American than the bald eagle.
- 8. George Washington was the first to declare Thanksgiving as a holiday, but it was on a year-to-year basis. Thomas Jefferson canceled Thanksgiving during his presidency. He refused to declare the holiday because he fervently believed in the separation of church and state, and thought that the day of "prayer" violated the First Amendment. It wasn't until 1863, when Abraham Lincoln proclaimed Thanksgiving a federal holiday and officially scheduled it to fall on the fourth Thursday of November.
- 9. FDR tried to change the date of Thanksgiving to the second-to-last Thursday in November in an attempt to lift the economy during the Great Depression. The idea being that it would give people more time to shop for Christmas. But it ended up making everybody confused. After two years, Congress ditched the new policy and set the fourth Thursday of November as the legal holiday.
- 10. Minnesota produces more turkey than any other state in America. North Carolina, Missouri Arkansas, and Virginia are also top producers.

 11. The White House has a tradition of pardoning one lucky turkey each year. George H. W. Bush was the first president to officially grant a turkey a presidential pardon.

Cornbread Stuffing

(a Michael Symon original)

Ingredients

4 Tbsp. butter

2 cups chopped yellow onions

1 cup chopped celery

2 cups corn kernels (fresh if available)

2 Tbsp. minced garlic

1 cup diced red pepper

1/2 pound diced smoked ham

2 eggs

3 cups chicken stock

1/2 cup heavy cream

2 Tbsp. chopped parsley

8 cups cubed and toasted cornbread

salt and pepper to taste

Directions

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Melt butter. Add vegetables and sauté until tender. Add ham and cook over low heat for 2 more minutes. Set aside to slightly cool. Whisk together eggs, stock, cream and herbs and season with salt and pepper. Combine all items, including cornbread, in a 4 quart lasagna pan and bake covered with foil for 30 minutes. Uncover and bake for additional 20 minutes or until crusty.
