The 25th General Synod of the Polish National Catholic Church met at Our Lady of the Snows Shrine in Belleville, IL, from October 1 through October 3, 2018. A significant time was spent evaluating the work of the Future Direction program over the past four years and moved forward to continue to implement the five themes developed by the 24th PNCC Synod in 2014: Growth and Membership, Increased Spirituality, Lifelong Learning, Sacred Vocations and Community Presence and Involvement.

HERBATA GÓRALSKA POLISH HIGHLANDER TEA

Tea leaves with vodka from the Polish Zakapone Tera Mountains

Makes 2 quarts

INGREDIENTS

4 cups boiling water 8 black tea bags 6 tablespoons raspberry syrup 4 cups vodka 1/2 cup rum 1/2 cup sugar

Juice of one lemon

INSTRUCTIONS

- Add tea bags to boiling water
- Steep 10 minutes before removing the tea bags
- Add raspberry syrup, vodka, rum, sugar, and lemon juice
- Stir until sugar dissolves
- Bottle and store for two months (this is from the Polish recipe, we enjoyed the same day)
- Serve warm

Holiday in Poland

On Sunday, August 19, 2918 eighteen people left from Our Lord's Ascension Church's parking lot on a bus headed for JFK Airport in New York City to begin our trip to Poland. Our plane left JFK about 11:30 PM. It was a 7 ½ hour flight to Poland via a Boeing 787 Dreamliner airplane. We had a nice flight.

We arrived in Warsaw on Monday, August 20 in the afternoon, their time. They are 6 hours ahead of us. Fr. Bogdan greeted us at the airport as he was already in Poland visiting family. We also met our tour guide, Christopher, who was with us the rest of the trip. We boarded our tour bus and went to our hotel to rest and get ready for our dinner in a local restaurant in old Warsaw. Dinner was a typical Polish meal with vodka.

I just want to state that all our breakfasts and dinners were top shelf. The variety of food we had to pick from was out of this world. I would compare it to that of a top cruise ship.

After breakfast on Tuesday morning we went on a sight-seeing tour of old Warsaw. This city was rebuilt after World War II. It had been leveled by the Germans during the war. We saw the Royal Castle, seat of the Polish Kings. We drove by the Warsaw Ghetto in route to the beautiful Lazienki Park. There we had a coffee break and a taste of the famous Polish doughnuts "paczki." The rest of the day we had free time. Some of us went back to the bar at the hotel for drinks. The Polish beer was excellent, the best I ever drank.

Wednesday, after breakfast, we left for Czestochowa, the pilgrimage center of Poland. Here our tour started at the Jasna Gora Monastery and the Black Madonna Shrine. We had a monk give us a guided tour. If you ever go to Poland, you must see this place. Ninety percent of the people who go there are either Polish or of Polish descent. After the tour, Fr. Bogdan reserved a chapel at the monastery and had mass for our group. It was a very moving experience. At the end of mass, we all sang "Serdeczna Matko." It sounded so nice. After lunch we continued to the resort of Zakopane at the foot of the Tatra Mountains. It was my favorite place that we visited. Driving through the little towns and villages and looking at the rolling hills was really breath-taking. Poland is a truly beautiful country.

Early Thursday morning Leslie and I went for a walk around the resort and saw the beautiful architecture of the homes. After breakfast we all went on a sight-seeing tour of Zakopane and visited the sanctuary of "Our Lady of Fatima" built by the local "gorale" as a votive for saving the life of Pope John Paul II after an assassination attempt on his life.

We admired the views of the Tatras from the top of the Gubalowka Mountains. We shopped for souvenirs and crafts at a local bazaar. In the afternoon we drove to Pieniny National Park where we went on a boat ride down the Dunajec River. The sights were awesome. That night we had a typical highland dinner with "Gorale" folk entertainment.

Friday after breakfast we departed for Krakow. On the way we stopped in Wieliczka, the oldest salt mine in Europe. We toured the underground chambers, sculptures carved by many generations of miners. After lunch at a local restaurant we continued to our destination in Krakow.

Saturday, we toured the Wawel Castle and Cathedral where Polish Kings were crowned and buried. Then we spent time in the market square where they have outside dining, vendors and music. This market square is often pictured on the news when they feature Krakow.

On Sunday we drove to Auschwitz and Bierkanow, the former concentration camps and now a museum. It was a very sad place. Many people were crying and adding to the misery was a rain that continued all day. It is difficult to imagine what those inmates went through.

We returned to Krakow via Wodowice. This is the birthplace of Karol Wojtyla (St. John Paul II.) We saw his house and the church where he was baptized. This is also the city where my grandparents came from. I felt like I came home. This is where it all started for my family. Someday I would like to return. We had coffee and pastries at a local Polish bakery.

Our farewell dinner was at the oldest Krakow restaurant which served kings throughout the years. They put on a folklore show for us plus some of us joined in the dancing. Don't believe what they say about me in Poland. "What happens in Poland, stays in Poland." We all sang "Jak Szybko Mijaja Chwile." How swiftly time passes. It was a great week!

Monday, after breakfast, we were transported to the airport, said good-by to our tour guide and boarded our plane for our flight back to America. We gained six hours back in time and arrived about 11:30 PM in the church parking lot.

This was the best trip I was ever on. If you ever get a chance to visit Poland, GO! We are planning to go back to Poland in 2020 and do the northern tour of this beautiful country.
